

Our Light Party


LORD, we pray for our Light Party on 31st. We ask that the word will spread around and folk of all ages will come along.

A scarecrow is a figure traditionally used in the fields to deter birds and other animals from consuming crops.

SCARECROWS in the Bible?!

A scarecrow is metaphorically mentioned in the Bible in the book of Jeremiah where the prophet compares lifeless, powerless idols to scarecrows in a field, highlighting their inability to speak, walk, or have any effect at all.

This comparison underscores the futility of worshipping idols instead of the living God.

Like a scarecrow in a melon patch, their idols cannot speak; they must be carried because they cannot walk. Do not fear them; they can do no harm, nor can they do any good.

Surge of young people, 18-24 year olds, coming to faith and church



HEAR THE SOUND of hearts returning to You - These words come from a worship song and I have often wondered, as we sing, what those returning hearts actually sound like! Because surely, a heart doesn't make any sound at all, does it?

Yet on reflection I realise that what is happening inwardly will be seen and heard outwardly.

I look at the statistics* highlighted by CVM (Christian Vision for Men) that show belief in God among eighteen to twenty four olds has almost tripled in just three and a half years, rising from 16% in August 2021 to 45% in January 2025, with 16% now attending church regularly.

Christian belief has also risen among older adults and the total number of monthly church goers has risen in six years from 3.7 million to 5.8 million.

And then I think of the sound of returning hearts: feet at the door, warm greetings, hearty singing, murmured prayers, alleluias, amens, attentive listening, laughter, tears, chatter, deep conversations.

And then back, back into the world with desires stirring in love for God and neighbour; back home, to work, to college, to uni, back to love, back to care, back to pray, back to gossip the gospel, and listen . . . for the sound of more returning hearts.
